McKinney award to Kaiser Permanente for its <u>commitment of \$200 million to fund</u> <u>housing and services organizations</u> serving homeless people across the country, showcasing the difference that private sector investment can make.

<u>Sue Vento</u> presented the 2018 Bruce F. Vento to <u>Congressman Elijah Cummings</u> for his years of service and commitment to social justice, and especially his leadership on Title V of the McKinney-Vento Act, in partnership with the Law Center. <u>View his powerful speech here</u>.

Julie Jordan, Law Center board member and event chair, presented the 2018 pro bono counsel award to the Goldman Sachs Legal Department Pro Bono committee, which <u>worked with the Law Center</u> on our NYC Housing Not Handcuffs survey, capturing the impact of criminalization on homeless people in midtown Manhattan. And <u>Khadijah Williams</u>, the newest Law Center Board member, presented our 2018 Personal Achievement award to Valerie Grischy. Valerie is a San Diego resident who became disabled, lost her job, and is now living in her vehicle. She is one of several named plaintiffs in our <u>federal court class action case challenging the city's</u> <u>laws</u> that daily threatens Valerie and hundreds like her with fines, arrest and impoundment of their vehicles. We honored her and her fellow plaintiffs for the personal courage in speaking out and taking a stand against this injustice.

DC Council Votes to Decriminalize Fare Evasion

The Law Center celebrates an important victory after the DC City Council, in its first of two votes on the measure, voted 11-2 for DC Bill 22-408, The Fare Evasion Decriminalization Amendment Act. This bill will convert the excessive criminal penalties that have led to arrest, jail-time, and criminal records for those suspected of failing to pay a \$2 fare on the DC Metro to a civil fine, as vehicle traffic violations are treated. Criminal enforcement of fare evasion has proven especially harmful to young people, black and brown residents, and low- and no-income residents, including those experiencing homelessness, who rely on public transit and are most likely to be targeted by enforcement. The DC Council will take a final vote on the bill on December 4, but the bill is still in danger of being amended or weakened, so those in DC wishing to support the campaign should send a letter to their Councilmembers, or watch for opportunities for engagement on our Twitter feed with the hashtag #ItsNotFare.

New Report: Serving and Protecting? Survey Results on Homeless New Yorkers' Experience with Law Enforcement

The Law Center, in conjunction with the Housing Not Handcuffs Campaign, recently released a new report titled, "Serving and Protecting? Survey Results on Homeless <u>New Yorkers' Experience with Law Enforcement</u>". In January 2018, the Law Center coordinated volunteers from Goldman Sachs, Fried Frank Harris Shriver & Jacobson LLP, and Cleary Gottlieb Steen & Hamilton LLP in conducting surveys of 90 persons experiencing homelessness at Holy Apostle Soup Kitchen in Manhattan. The report analyzes results from these surveys, which overwhelmingly indicated that law enforcement often harasses, cites, and arrests homeless persons for activities such as sleeping, eating, or merely existing in a place. The report also offers constructive policy recommendations that aim to decriminalize homelessness and reach permanent housing solutions.

Housing Not Handcuffs Campaign Two Year Anniversary and Web Convening

The Housing Not Handcuffs (HNH) Campaign celebrated its two year anniversary on Thursday, November 15, 2018. The Campaign was launched in 2016 by the Law Center, together with the National Coalition for the Homeless and more than 100 other national and local organizations, in order to combat the criminalization of homelessness and promote the right to adequate housing. The Campaign now has almost 800 endorsements including several from public officials and members of law enforcement, as well as over 300 from local and national organizations. In honor of the anniversary, HNH held a web convening in which Maria Foscarinis, Executive Director of the Law Center, spoke about the several victories that the Campaign has had over the past two years. Members of local organizations gave updates about their work, and Campaign members discussed their goals for the next year.
